1. General Information:

The course will introduce participants to the available social standards and technological tools to monitor and evaluate human rights abuses in fishing operations and analyse the risk of a fishing fleet or vessel.

Provide participants with the knowledge and tools necessary to assess and report on risk in the fish value chain when assessing a supplier or fleet, as well as assess compliance and effective implementation of processes in taking of decisions.

2. Objectives:

This workshop aims to provide available technological tools to monitor and assess human rights abuses in fishing operations and analyse the risk of a fishing fleet or vessel. Also, it will review the current available social standards, online evaluation guides and will explain the market and NGO policies regarding social responsibility on board fishing vessels.

Participants will gain the necessary knowledge and tools to assess and report on compliance and effective implementation of supplier decision-making and analysis processes in the fish value chain, understand the different standards available and how they are aligned; and contribute to the continuous improvement of a quality management system (QMS).
